Alberta Human Rights Act

- On September 1, 2010, Section 11.1 of the Alberta Human Rights Act comes into force. The section requires school boards to notify parents where "courses of study, educational programs or instructional materials, or instruction or exercises include subject matter that deals primarily and explicitly with religion, human sexuality, religious themes or sexual orientation."
- School boards must provide parents with the opportunity to exempt their children from instruction that **primarily** and **explicitly** involves this subject matter.
- It is important to note that Section 11.1 of the *Alberta Human Rights Act* does **not** apply to incidental or indirect references to this subject matter.
- At the beginning of the school year or semester, school principals will be sending letters to their students' parents outlining where their children will encounter this subject matter, along with a form parents can return if they want their children exempted from this type of instruction.
- Alberta Education has updated the Guide to Education to reflect the changes
 to the Alberta Human Rights Act. Parents may wish to review pages 71 to 73
 to learn more about the changes. A link to the document is available on the

October will see the start of **ACT Now!** - Ainlay Career Thursdays - Harry Ainlay's **popular speaker series** which will feature speakers presenting valuable information about possible **career choices** such as engineering, journalism, graphic design, police services and many more! WORK EXPERIENCE

- Do you have a job or volunteer?
- You can use your hours for Work Experience credits and raise your GPA.
- Grade 10, 11 and 12 students are all eligible for Work Experience.

Students can gain valuable experience in a career field, can be paid for this experience and earn high school credits towards their high school diploma. The Work Experience program can:

- develop employable skills
- increase awareness of health and safety practices in the workplace
- promote networking within the business community.

You can work after school or on weekends in positions such as:

- business offices
- industries
- recreational facilities
- restaurants
- retail
- services.

You can earn 3 to 10 credits at each level of Work Experience 15, 25 and 35.

Students may register for Work Experience in 1st or 2nd semester.

NOTE: Documented registration for students taking Work Experience must be completed by February 10, 2012.

Health Internship

Grade 11 students can:

- spend six weeks in the summer job-shadowing healthcare professionals in hospitals, pharmacies and clinics
- earn Work Experience credits toward a high school diploma and
- earn an honourarium.

The Health Internship Program provides students with an opportunity to familiarize themselves with careers in the health services field and to gain valuable experiences. Students can only apply during their Grade 11 year. As much as possible, each successful candidate is placed in his or her area of interest and preference of location.

REGISTERED APPRENTICE PROGRAM (RAP)

A RAP student can:

- learn valuable **skills as an apprentice** in one of 51 skilled trades
- while earning a high school diploma
- and earning a **competitive wage**.

The RAP program is designed to give students an opportunity to complete all or a portion of their first-year apprenticeship while they earn a high school diploma. Students can apply during their Grade 10 or 11 year and will spend a portion of their school year working in the field under the supervision of a journeyman.

Harry Ainlay Parents: Are you working in a science-related field?

The main objective of the science work experience program would be to provide students an opportunity to gain valuable skills and experience in a science-related field.

It would also provide Harry Ainlay students the opportunity to gain credits along with potentially boosting their academic average.

The process would involve informing students about a science position through our school communication networks, an application process and possibly an interview with the company supervisor.

The positions could be volunteer or paid positions.

The minimum time required would be 75 hours either during the:

- school year (September to June) or
- summer (July to August)

During the school year, students could be available to work during the regular school day depending on their class timetable as well as evenings and/or weekends.



INTERNATIONAL **BACCALACUREATE**

2010-2011: Another Successful Year for Harry **Ainlay IB Students!**

The results are in and Harry Ainlay IB students once again have demonstrated their perseverance and academic prowess. There were 215 students who wrote their exams in May 2011 as a culmination of their two year IB odyssey. Of those students, 147 received an IB certificate and 68 obtained their full IB Diploma. To receive an IB diploma students had to be successful in six courses: 1) English 2) History 3) Biology or Physics 4) Math 5) One of: French, German, Japanese or Spanish, and 6) One of: Music, Art, Theatre or a second science. Diploma students also had to submit both a 4000 word Extended Essay and a Theory of Knowledge essay.

In this rigorous program, our students beat the world average in English, History, Biology, Chemistry, Physics (HL & SL), Math, Art, French, German, Music (Group Performance) and Theatre. The average grade which was obtained by candidates who passed the diploma was 5.19 out of a possible 7.0. Well done to all of our 2011 IB students!

LIBRARY

Library Gets Renovated: After 45 years library gets makeover

For the first time since the opening of Harry Ainlay in 1966, the library has reopened after an 8 month renovation. The library collection had been temporarily housed in the cafeteria since January and was moved to the renovated library during the summer.



"Our library is now much better prepared to support students and teachers in implementing our literacy plans for the future," said teacher librarian Mr. Poole. The new library features a 34 station computer lab, docking stations for digital devices, wi-fi access and two natural plant living walls at either end of the library. Students will be able to

sign out laptops and work in the new spaces which have been created in the renovation. New carpet and furniture will provide students with a comfortable place to meet and read. An improved circulation desk allows for better traffic flow and access to library staff for students.





District students continue to show promise for bright futures

To address the Board of Trustees' priority around student achievement, Edmonton Public Schools has focused on supporting the work of teaching and learning taking place in the classroom.

Over the course of the 2010-2011 school year, we moved forward with this vital work and have a few highlights to share.

- Since 2005-2006, Edmonton Public Schools' high school completion rate has increased 2.9 per cent, rising to 74.9 per cent. This is substantial, but we need to do even better.
- Our students did very well on provincial achievement tests compared to the Province, especially in Grades 6 and 9. We were also pleased to see that the percentage of students meeting the acceptable standard for the Grade 3 English language arts test is above 80 per cent for the first time in five years.
- For diploma exams, we saw gains in science-based subjects and French language arts.
 We are working to help more students do better on the math, social studies and English diploma exams.

The Board of Trustees and staff of Edmonton Public Schools will continue working with families and community organizations to help every student complete high school and realize their potential.
